Best Practice: 1

- **1. Title:** Sensitization of the Students of the College and Women of the Neighbourhood.
- **2. Goal:** With an aim to build up a spirited and sensible group of youth, the young future citizens of our Nation, amid a healthy and humane surrounding, the several units of our college work since the day one of each academic calendar.
- **3. Context:** For hundreds of students of our college, many of them are from remote villages and, socially and financially marginalized families, the college is something more than just a stepping stone to Higher Education. Apart from imparting the knowledge of prescribed university syllabi, the teachers consider it to be their sacred duty to develop the morale of the students and help them to acquire a good hygienic sense which will ultimately make our campus an ideal seat of learning.
- **4. The Practice:** The active units of NSS (2 units), NCC, Women Cell (WC) and Alumni Association (SGCAL) tirelessly endeavor to sensitize the students and the local girls and women through systematic in-campus and off-campus programmes. Besides this, a regular training class of KOREAN KARATE enables our students to be confident about self-defence and facing the odds of life.

NSS and WC of the college regularly conduct in and off campus awareness programmes. With the inspiring NSS motto, "Not Me but You", the students reach out to the female inmates of the neighbourhood slums to uplift their living conditions and moral health in their own little way, through various sensitization programmes. The NCC Unit acts as catalyst in bringing out the exuberant cadency of Ek Do Ek (marching command) which mirrors the inner strength of Cadets of Serampore Girls'College.

Sensitization Programmes of 2016-17:

- Awareness Programme on Protection of Child Right in college campus Shilbagan Slum Area, (NSS, 5th & 6th April, 2016.)
- Workshop on *Prevention of Child Marriage*. (WC, 6th July 2016.)
- Seminar in Celebration of International Human Rights Day: *Free Legal Rights of Women*. (WC,10th Dec, 2016.)
- Seminar in Celebration of International Women's Day: *Anti Girl Trafficking Movement*. (NSS &WC, 29th

March, 2017.)

 KOREAN KARATE training classes are held twice a week. Classes are conducted by trained and authorized trainers.

5. Evidence of Success:

- The whole hearted response of the neighbourhood and our stakeholders made the conveners of different units confident to carry on their projects. The initial success of the ventures encouraged them to expand the areas of discussion and activity and organize gender specific programmes with wider ambiance.
- A larger number of students have expressed their willingness to join the Cell and Units to take part in this noble venture of sensitization of girls and women. Since ours is a girls' college, the stakeholders, i.e. the guardians and the community people, are also enthusiastic about different

- 'on' and 'off' campus programmes which is evident in their willingness to extend their help for their children's activities, in spite of their limited resource.
- Our Sempai of KARATE team won several medals (3 Gold, 2 Silver, 1 bronze Medals) in District Level, organized by Tang Tsu Doo Karate Association of India in June, 2017. Presently our students are enthusiastically preparing for the next State level Championship in January, 2018.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- Most the students who take part in these programmes commute from distant places. In many cases they have to stay back in the college campus even after the academic classes are over. Extra Tiffin is required for them. Women Cell has no regular financial provision for this. We have approached the Finance Committee of the college to make provision for this support. The matter will be placed in the Governing Body.
- Though Railway concession is available for the students, multiple breaks-up of Bus/ Auto Rickshaw/ Toto/ Rickshaw journey to make up the time seem to be an extra burden.
- But the financial support from Kanyashree Project seems to solve other financial problems.
- The mother university provides regular grant for the activity of the NSS programmes as per rules.
- We yet to receive any government or university grant for KARATE training programme.

Best Practice: 2

- 1. **Title**: Hygienic and Echo Friendly Campus with Limited Waste Management System. (Plastic free Campus & Green Waste Management)
- 2. Goal: Inculcation of the spirit of cleanliness and awareness of threats to environment among the students and staff is the chief goal of this "Best Practice". Every day, the students, members of the faculty, office and other support staff, spend several hours in the college campus. Keeping the saying "Cleanliness is Next to Godliness" in mind we endeavor to live and breathe in an eco-friendly campus. We started with a moderate aim to make our campus Plastic Free & to carry out some initial processes to manage Green Waste. We also aim to preserve good hygiene by maintaining a proper sanitary system and providing pure drinking water to all our students and staff.

3. The Context:

- Every year, the students of III Year, prepare their compulsory Environment Science projects, based on practical classes for their University Examination. We came across the initiatives of the students of University of California Santa Barbara (UCSB) who launched the project of Plastic Free Campuses (PFC). Being inspired by this project our students also took the initiatives to make our campus plastic free.
- We also felt that our students should be made aware of the consequences of climate change.
- One of the reasons of different types of health hazards, especially those that riddle the females, is pollution and absence of proper sanitation. We felt it our prime duty to provide our students a clean and green campus as well as a clean sanitary facility and pure drinking water.

4. The Practice:

The college conducted Green Audit in 2015-16. We follow the advice provided in that report. We have taken different measures

- to make the campus eco-friendly (Plastic free Campus & Green Waste Management);
- to keep the several wash rooms clean and hygienic (the process of installation of Sanitary Napkin Vending and Incinerating Machine is in progress);
- to provide pure drinking water (several water purifying machines are installed and regularly maintained under AMC with the specific service providers).
- Echo Club (EC), two units of NSS, WC and SGCAL of the college undertake various scheduled activities and organize seminars and workshops, relating to environmental consciousness and cleanliness of the college campus.

Sensitization programmes conducted during 2016-17:

- o Seminar on "Threat of Global Warming" (EC, 18th August, 2016)
- Workshop on "Future of Excessive use of Plastic" (EC & NSS, 2nd-3rd November, 2016.)
- o Workshop on "Prevention of Wastage of Water and Electricity" (WC & NSS, 1st-2nd February, 2017.)
- o Seminar on "Recycling of E-waste" (EC & SGCAL, 5th-6th April, 2017)

5. Evidence of success:

- Positive responses of the local people and the nearby slum dwellers when our different units visit them with various awareness programmes, are the live evidences of the success of all these ventures.
- The students of our college have visibly made a commitment to reducing their plastic footprints and pledging to measurably reduce plastic pollution in college campus.
- Even the women and urchins of the selected houses of the locality have been trained to focus on the reduction and, sometimes, elimination of plastic bottles, utensils, straws, single-use plastic bags and food packaging. They in their own turns encourage others to practice the same.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- For the erection of new buildings to accommodate ever growing number of students in old and new subjects, 4 trees had to be hewed down with the necessary permission of the Forest Department of the State Government. Sufficient number of sapling have been planted in a different part of the campus to compensate the loss of greenery.
- For new constructions some good square feet are covered of rubble.
- In spite of our best efforts, sometimes it becomes difficult for us to make each and every student conscious of our intentions and concept of hygiene. Though the teachers and the group leaders of different units tirelessly try to drive home our intentions.
- Our students are engaging their imaginations, while their teachers are challenging their minds.

































SWOT ANALYSIS

Strengths:

- Our stakeholders are our true strength. An experienced and enthusiastic Principal, qualified and committed group of teachers, sincere librarian and office staff, passionate and energetic students and responsible guardians, all contribute to the overall success of our college.
- A sense of togetherness is the key of our reputation in the locality. Together we try to uphold the positive qualities in students, teachers and the administration.
- Our NSS unit won the best unit award from Calcutta University, participated in a couple of National programmes, including Republic Day Parade (RDP) in New Delhi.
- One NSS volunteer and one NCC Cadet acquired permanent Job in Bengal and Calcutta Police respectively.
- The academic ambiance of the collage is evident in the State level and National Seminars (UGC), conducted in regular intervals.
- Regular examinations (3 in one academic year for 1st year and 2 for 2nd & 3rd year students), Answer scripts checking followed by doubt clearing classes and Parent-Teacher Meetings---- all contribute towards a total amelioration of academic standard.
- The University of Calcutta has chosen our college as Zonal centre for several subjects. in University Examinations. A number of teachers function as Members of Board Of Studies (English & Philosophy), Paper Setters, Moderators, Examiners, Scrutineers in university examinations.
- The Members of the Governing Body take keen interest in the smooth and quality functioning of the college.

Weakness:

- A lack of Theoretical Class Room as well as Laboratory space is the most striking weakness of our college.
- Though 4 new teachers have joined in this academic session after a prolonged waiting, the departments of English, Sanskrit & History are still run by a single full time teacher each. The process of creation of new posts as well as the appointment of teachers in the vacant posts through the College Service is going on in an emergency basis.
- UGC grant is unavailable for Remedial Coaching class, Career Counseling & Service Training programmes.
- Research infrastructure is to be improved.

Opportunities:

- There is scope of industrial collaborations.
- The college can Reopen the job oriented Diploma Course in Tailoring.

- The college can apply for financial grant for building of Ladies' Hostel which is a crying need for our students from financially backward families, commuting from distant places.
- There is scope for grants from MP and MLA LAD Fund for setting up of Solar panels, which may help conservation of non-conventional energy as well as reduction of electricity bills to some extent.

Threats:

- Drop-out rate of the students pose a major threat to the college.
- Incompatibility of the demand of the admission seekers and inadequate space is a real challenge at the time of admission.
- One of the greatest challenges faced by the college is the paucity of fund for expansion to accommodate the ever increasing roll strength.
- Most importantly it is really challenging for many of the teaching and non-teaching staff of our college to improve upon communication and other soft skills to cope with the tech-savvy era.
