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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Serampore, located in West Bengal, has a great historical importance as it is a pre-colonial city on the bank of the Hooghly River. During 1755-1845, Denmark ruled over this town. The college is situated in this town where girls from all over the Hooghly district take admission due to its location advantage.

Serampore Girls' College, a distinguished women's college in the field of Higher Education for girls in Hooghly district of West Bengal, was established in an ancient building of Danish Period on 6th June in the year 1981 by a group of visionaries who stood for the propagation of female education in the sub-division and ultimately acted to fulfil the long standing demand of the people of Serampore sub-division for a college exclusive for girls.

The noted educationist and the then President of West Bengal Higher Secondary Council late Smt. Anila Devi inaugurated the college.

Affiliated to the University of Calcutta, this govt.-aided college was originally started with only 47 of students on its roll and with only seven general subjects in humanities group - Bengali, Sanskrit, English, History, Philosophy, Political Science, and Education, Computer Science and Geography as Optional and Pass Papers in B.A. General Programme that were later extended to Honours level.

In 1983 the first batch of students was sent for their Graduation Examination

Honours programme in Computer Science and Geography were introduced in 2004-05, In the same year generic elective subjects (then general subjects) -Mathematics, Music, Economics, Physical Education, Electronics, Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, Hindi, Urdu and Sociology were introduced.

A significant percentage of population of surrounding area are Hindi and Urdu speaking community and they are willing to send their wards only to girls' college for higher education. To cater higher education to such girls Hindi and Urdu as general subjects were introduced in 2006 and 2007 respectively. Dept. of Music and Economics were established in 2016 and that of Physical Education was established in 2017.

Today, Serampore Girls' college has an average of 1800-2100 students on its roll per year, 54 faculty members, 9 Undergraduate Honours and 12 exclusively Undergraduate Pass Courses (later called General, and now Generic Elective) besides various Certificate Courses. All teaching and non-teaching staff are deeply committed to their service for holistic developments of the girls.

At the time of inception there was no own land for the college. Now college is running with two own campus areas separated by a narrow municipal lane.

The students from all categories of population mainly from low socio economic background come to college travelling a long distance from remote and urban places of Hooghly district following its high repute of excellence and academic ambience .

- Resourceful Library with updated books, journals, newspapers and e-resources
- Timely examinations- continuous internal examination, class test and tutorials are conducted along with the publication of results for the improvement of the academic performance of the students
- Distance learning program is there for the students
- Introduction of skill based program for developing a pathway to interact with the corporate world
- Good coordination among the stakeholders is there in the institution for the betterment and empowerment of the students
- High coordination, team work and healthy relationship between the faculty members
- The faculty is qualified, dedicated and empathetic, and the cordial students, teacher relationship is rare for a non- residential institution.

- Limited program option in Science Department.
- Lack of Linkage between the Institution and Industry.
- Limited Space for providing hostel facilities for the Girls' student of this college
- Poor communication skill of the students
- Limited faculty development program
- Large number of students suffer from financial constraints.
- Limited interaction with alumni.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

College authority is always trying its level best to provide infrastructure both physical and academic to students. At present, the college has a well-maintained Administrative Building, Classrooms, Laboratories, Smart Classrooms, Library, Seminar Hall, ICT-enabled classrooms, Common Room for Girls with indoor game facilities, and computing equipment to adopt to the futuristic Education System keeping in tune with the New Education Policy (2020).

Infrastructure Augmentation and maintenance is a regular process in the college. In last 5 years one 4 storied building and one storied building has been completed. New Library building and two computer Labs has been established. More than 25% of total expenditure excluding salary has been utilised for infrastructure augmentation.

The prized possession of the college is its well-stocked library with open access system, a separate reading room and a reprographic division adjacent to the library. College Library is planning full automation within a few days. Commercial library software named KOHA has been installed towards automation of the library activities. The library is the member of N-LIST consortium of INFLIBNET.

The college deploys and upgrades its IT (ICT and smart classroom) infrastructure and associated facilities every year to fulfil the needs of the students in keeping with the changing syllabus. At present college campus is Wi-Fi enabled. Sufficient number of computers are available for students use.

Academic, administrative building, garden and playground are regularly maintained. More than 50% of total expenditure has been incurred on maintenance of infrastructure, physical and academic support facilities.

Student Support and Progression

Every year a significant number of students receive government scholarships and institutional free ships as significant number of students comes from low socio-economic background.

Nearly 18 capacity building and skill enhancement initiatives has been taken by the college in last five years to increase skill levels of the students and to make them ready for job market in future.

Career counselling sessions are regularly held with internal (faculty) and external experts from various organizations. An online portal has been implemented within college to conduct job oriented tests for students.

College has an active grievance cell and Anti Ragging cell to monitor and take necessary action to redress student's grievance including sexual harassment and ragging.

Every academic department keeps regular record of pass out students taking admission in post graduate and B.Ed course and placement in govt and private sectors. A significant number of Honours pass out students are admitted in post graduate courses.

Students are encouraged to actively participate in the diverse array of extracurricular activities diligently organized by the college's Sports and Cultural Committee. These enriching pursuits not only foster the development of athletic prowess and cultural proficiency but also cultivate a vibrant and dynamic campus environment.

A significant number of students received awards/medals in in sports/cultural competitions at university/state/national level

College has an active alumni association. Members of the association participate in career counselling for current students, provide guidance in NSS activities and community service in college adjacent slum areas.

Response:

Serampore Girls' College is affiliated to The University of Calcutta and complies with its prescribed syllabi and curriculum.

Effective Curriculum Planning

- Before the commencement of a new session, a meeting of the Academic committee of the college is held to chalk out the outlines of the academic calendar. A thorough plan about the teaching-learning process, internal assessments and final results are discussed. The faculty members suggest measures for improvement and execution of such plans.
- The Academic calendar provides a list of all the academic and extra-curricular activities along with the tentative dates.
- The faculty members submit a list of required books to the librarian for the upcoming academic session
- A centralized time table is prepared and uploaded in the College website by the Routine Committee before the commencement of the session. In respect to that a Departmental time table is also walled up on the Departmental notice board.
- Each department plans and distributes the assignment as per the syllabus and allotted classes.

Effective Delivery of Curriculum:

- At the beginning of each session, a newly prepared prospectus is provided to each student admitted in the college.
- On the first day of the academic session, an Orientation Programme is organized by the institution. In that programme the Principal of the college addresses the students and informs them about the rules and regulations of the institution. The teachers are introduced to the students and Academic Calendar is distributed to them.
- Each department informs the students about the Course Outcome which is walled up in the departmental rooms.
- A library Orientation Programme is organized to introduce the students to the process of accessing the Library and e- resources.
- The library contains the syllabus and previous year question paper of each and every subjects.
- In addition to the conventional Chalk and Talk method, ICT based methods are extensively used. During the Covid period Online classes and Assessment both Internal and External were conducted through Zoom, Google meet and Whatsapp group. Study materials were uploaded on the College websites.

- Various students centric activities like study tour, seminar, extension lecture, quiz, debate and projects are conducted for the enrichment and enhancement of the skill of the students.
- Well equipped laboratories are available for the conduct of practical classes.
- Student progression is monitored through Continuous Internal Evaluation System. This allows the students to address strength and weakness before University exams. Class test, Remedial Classes, Doubt Clearance session, Parent- teachers meeting are conducted for student's improvement.
- Certificate Courses and Skill development courses are arranged by the institution to supplement the curriculum. For example Certificate Course in Communicative English.
- The enrichment of the faculty members is necessary for better academic deliverance. In order to foster that the institution allows the teachers to participate in FDP, Refresher, Orientation and Short term courses.
- Feedback is collected from the students and teachers at regular interval. This is analysed by the IQAC with the aim to assess efficiency in Curriculum deliverance.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

It is a challenge to the teachers of all institutions to convert the traditional chalk and talk method of teaching to student-centric methods to ensure active participation of the students in the learning process.

The teachers have maintained a balance between chalk and talk and ICT enabled tools in teaching. At the beginning of each session a copy of the academic calendar is provided to all the students. The following student-centric methods of teaching are used:-

ICT TOOLS:.

- Teachers frequently use 2 smart classrooms, 14 ICT enabled classrooms with Wi-Fi, Laptops and dongles for conducting academic activities.
- Teachers share e-resources through Whatsapp groups, Google classroom (Learning Management System) and departmental page of the College website.
- In lockdown period online classes were held routine wise on Zoom, Google Meet platform, PPTs and Google classrooms. The college subscribed G suit account with recording facilities and Google workspace for the smooth functioning of online classes and webinars during the pandemic. Class tests were conducted through Google forms and Google classrooms. Jamboard and virtual labs were used for practical based subjects. Online University Examinations were conducted through the Examination portal of the college.
- The Automated Library is equipped with KOHA enabled with OPAC facility and INFLIBNET.
- The students use Computer Centre to prepare their projects, term papers, power point presentation and assignments and for conducting Skill development Courses.
- Video lectures on academic subjects are uploaded in the college You Tube channel

Experiential Learning:

- Field Visit-Most of the department arrange study tours, field visits, museum visits, excursions, for the students. Students prepare Term Paper, Field reports and Survey reports with the help of ICT tools.
- Project - Submission of project report on Environmental Science is mandatory for all students. Students of Sociology, Geography, Physics, Zoology and Botany prepare Projects using ICT tools.
- Practical- Students of Physics, Botany, Zoology, Computer Science, Chemistry, Geography, Physical Education and Music learn through regular practical classes.
- Heritage Club-Students undertake Heritage walk to the local sites with the Heritage Club to explore the cultural heritage of Serampore.

Participative Learning:

- Students participate in Quiz, Group discussions, Debate, Stage performance (syllabus) Extension lecture and Faculty exchange programmes using ICT tools.
- Advanced learners use ICT Tools for PPTs, Students Seminars and Peer teaching.
- College magazine, Wall magazines and departmental E- magazines are prepared and displayed. Students contribute articles, poems, sketches, stories on academic and social aspects.

- Students actively participate in various competitions-- Poster making, drawing, essay writing, to develop their learning skills.
- Students enroll in Add on Courses. They also participate in Viva voce (English, Sanskrit and Bengali), as a part of their Tutorials, to develop their communicative skills.

Problem Solving Methodology

- Doubt-clearing classes are held regularly after each CIE. In these classes the answer scripts of CIE are shown to the students and their doubts are cleared.
- In Open House and Mentoring classes the students express their grievances on any aspect of their institution. The problems of the students are addressed and solutions, within the capacity of the college, are provided.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms**2.5.1**

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Serampore Girls' College, affiliated to the University of Calcutta, strictly adheres to the rules and regulations laid down by the University.

Internal Examination**Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE):-**

Following the Academic Calendar the College has adopted the practice of regular CIE to assess the progress of learners, prepares the students for the university examination and gives them a scope to correct their errors. To make CIE objective, intensive & transparent, the college has introduced the following reforms:

- Mode of CIE- 1. Written test for all papers of 20 marks each through centralized system
- 2. Class test by the departments – online and offline
- 3. Viva- voce test

- Students are notified about the CIE through the Academic calendar and Official notice on the College website in order to make the examination process transparent, time bound and efficient. As regards to frequency, for each Semester two CIEs are held before the Internal Assessment.
- The marks scored in CIE are walled up on the notice board. The evaluated scripts are shown to students and their grievances regarding exam related issues are addressed in **doubt-clearing classes**. Teachers discuss the errors and justify the score to individual student to ensure that the students find the evaluation unbiased and transparent.
- Students scoring poor marks are designated as slow learners. Special **remedial classes** are conducted for them.
- **Parent-Teacher meetings** are conducted for those students who remain absent or fail in both CIEs. This practice makes them alert about the forthcoming final examination.
- **Re-examination** for students who missed the CIE exam has made the process of screening easier.

External Examination- End Semester Final Examination

The University of Calcutta has introduced CBCS from the academic session 2018-19. In this system 35% of marks are awarded through Internal Evaluation and 65% is awarded by external examiners in the end semester theory examination. For practical based subjects, 50% of marks are awarded each for internal and external evaluation. For non-practical subjects, out of 35% internal evaluation, 10% marks are allotted for attendance, 10% for Internal Assessment and 15% for Tutorials. All Examination related information's are uploaded in the College website. All arrangements for Review and RTI are made by the college to address the grievances of students in University examinations

- Internal and Tutorial assessment are conducted as per University notification.
- Tutorial projects and writing term papers comprising written test, viva voce and field survey are evaluated on the basis of originality. These assignments are time-bound and a dateline is fixed for submission. External Subject Experts from other colleges are assigned to conduct practical examinations for the sake of transparency.
- Analytical & presentational skills of the students are tested through expertise in preparation of Notebooks in Practical based subjects. Communicative skills of the learners is tested through Viva-Voce not mandated by the University.

The institution acts as a platform not only for the attainment of Academic and Professional skills, but also fosters all round development of student as a responsible human being. The assessment regarding attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes can be categorized as:-

Academic Attainment:-

- The CO and PO are evaluated by the institution for each student. It is calculated on the basis of the data obtained from the marks scored by them in Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) and End- semester University examination.
- **Assessment Process-** The attainment of PO and CO is measured in a 5 point scale for CIE and 10 point scale as per University rule, for End semester final examination. If the attainment is poor, certain measures are undertaken. For example, class notes, suggestive reading, discussion sessions, parent- teachers meeting and remedial classes are organized. The teacher takes special care of each weak student, thereby suggesting methods for improvement.
- **Continuous Internal Evaluation-** - After the results of CIE are walled up, the performance of the students are mapped in terms of Excellent/ Very Good/ Good/ Average / Poor. The class performance of the students in terms of regularity, attentiveness, interactive and hardworking is taken into consideration.
- **University Final Exam-** After the declaration of the final University results, each department places the report of result analysis before the academic committee. Students are categorized in terms of their CGPA and SGPA and pass outs in first attempt.
- **Students Progression-** The department keeps a record of the students opting for higher education/ job training/ qualifying competitive examination/ jobs.

Higher education department raised intake capacity by around 21% after implementation of NEP. The academic and physical infrastructure of the college is being upgraded accordingly.

Being a govt. aided college, Serampore Girls' College follows orders, policies of the dept. of higher education, govt. of WB. Development, long-term policies are taken by the governing body of college.

Administrative set up:

For Assistant professors, appointed by College service commission, the appraisal system is as per government rule of career advancement scheme: the number of classes taken by the teacher in each academic year, refresher/faculty development program they attend, article/book publication, research guidance, administrative work etc. If the yearly and or periodic score exceeds the minimum marks prescribed in the order 1373-Edn(CS)/5P-52/98 dated 07.12.2017 then it is processed for promotion. An expert team is formed with one or two subject experts from affiliating University, one from department of higher education and principal to measure the performance of the assistant professor.

Response:

IQAC of the institution plans, guides and monitors the effectual and progressive performance of the

academic and administrative quality of the institution. The initiatives taken by IQAC are as follows:-

Teaching Learning Process:

- All academic and extra- curricular activities are carried out as per the Academic Calendar. The academic performance of the students are monitored through the Continuous Internal Examinations. The Slow learners and advanced learners are marked, Parent teachers meeting (departmental and centralized) are held and remedial classes are organized. Doubt clearance classes are held to maintain transparency.
- After publication of University results the college prepares statistical data for each department. In joint meeting of academic committee and IQAC these analyses are discussed to devise methods for improvement. There are interactions with all the Departments to ascertain the degree of attainment of the POs and COs.
- During Covid- lockdown period online classes and examinations were conducted through centralized class routine on Google meet, Google classroom, G suite and study materials were uploaded on the college website.
- All the departments prepare an Annual departmental reports (stating departmental activities) and place it before the IQAC.
- IQAC also contributed in organizing seminars, webinar and workshop. In 2022-2023 Department of Political Science and Sociology has organized an International Seminar on Caste Politics.
- **The Learning Outcomes** are determined by student's performance in all the participative learning activities, performance in internal assessment and University exam, qualifying for Higher education and competitive exams and development of employability skills.

Quality Assurance Strategies

- The IQAC has taken initiatives in enabling the facilities of PowerPoint projectors in all departmental classrooms. It enables the teachers and students to conduct ICT Classes, Student Seminars etc.
- With the initiative of the IQAC the Library facilities has been enhanced to meet the Curriculum. - Introduction of WEBEL Diploma, Certificate courses and Add on Courses help the students to bridge the rigid confines between various disciplines and move towards a multi-disciplinary form of education.
- A significant contribution of IQAC is reintroduction of three Science subjects- Chemistry, Zoology and Botany in B.Sc General Programme in 2019-2020. In order to facilitate extracurricular activities of the students- Heritage club, Music club, Electoral Literacy Club was founded.
- Faculty members are encouraged to participate in Orientation, Refresher Courses, FDP's , Workshops, Seminars and conferences related to the teacher-learning process and research. Career Advancement Scheme is timely processed by IQAC.
- The IQAC has arranged talks in the College by experts in the field of NAAC assessment which have helped in streamlining the preparation of AQARs and the SSR.
- NIRF data and AISHE data submitted regularly.
- The IQAC conducts Academic, Administrative, Green Audit and Gender Audit for proper

utilization of accounts.

A large number of students of the college are from minority category, reserved categories, lower income group and 1st generation learners. They are unaware and deprived of the opportunities, scopes and rights available to them. Some of the problems faced by the women in the society are - Domestic Violence, Health Hazard, Deprived of Equal opportunity in Education and Financial Insecurity. In order to raise awareness among the students- the Women's Cell of our college organizes several Sensitization Programs where they get a platform to share and discuss their experiences. To combat physical assault and to be mentally and physically strong, students are trained for Self-defense.

Women's Cell of the college has conducted a Gender Audit for the academic session 2022-2023 with the objective

- To understand the college's current practices and situation from a gender perspective, identifying gaps and strong points.
- To gather qualitative and quantitative data, that will then analyse and identify the gaps and strong points of the college regarding gender issues.
- To create the baseline on which to design of the Gender Equality Plan.
- To establish good gender balance in decision-making processes in all college activities

Empowerment and Resilience: A Journey through Women's Self-Defence

OBJECTIVE:

The self-defence program for undergraduate girls serves a multi-faceted purpose, aiming to enhance physical and mental health while addressing to safety concerns.

a. Enhancing Physical and Mental Health:

- Recognizing the need for comprehensive well-being, the self-defence program seeks to ensure good physical and mental health among undergraduate girls. Through physical training and mental resilience exercises, participants will develop the strength and confidence needed to navigate challenges of defending oneself effectively.

b. Extracurricular Activity

Understanding the importance of a balanced lifestyle, the self-defence program is designed to serve as a dynamic extracurricular activity. By incorporating energizing physical activities, it aims to provide a refreshing break from academic routines, rejuvenating the mind and body while focusing on stress management.

CONTEXT:

Many students, especially those from rural and semi-urban areas, face safety concerns while commuting to college. The self-defence program becomes crucial in building confidence and addressing potential threats. Urban students also benefit from stress management and preparation for careers in police and defence forces.

Practice:

The Korean Karate (TANG SOO DO) training program at Serampore Girls' College, initiated in 2016, focuses on enhancing self-confidence and physical fitness. The curriculum aligns with the TANG SOO DO SPORTS ASSOCIATION OF WEST BENGAL, offering certifications such as Green Belt, Orange Belt, and Brown Belt. The program's success is evidenced by improved health, self-esteem, academic performance, and mastery of self-defence techniques among participants.

Certificate Course on Self-Defence: A 10-day certificate course was conducted by Mr. Bimal Pal, Trainer Bengal Kyokushin Karate Organization. 64 attendees acquiring self-defence basics training and Kyokushin Karate skills. The outcome included increased self-confidence, mental peace, and a desire for continued participation in similar programs.

Evidence of Success:

Belt Grades Achieved (October 2016 to December 2019):

- Brown Belt: 4 students
- Yellow Belt: 12 students
- Orange Belt: 24 students
- Green Belt: 37 students

Participation and Achievements in Competitions: Students actively participate in District, State, and National TANG SOO DO KARATE competitions, achieving notable success:

 - Gold Medal: 2 Students

- *2019 - 3rd TANG SOO DO KARATE State Championship:*
 - Gold Medal: 1 Student
 - Silver Medal: 3 Students
 - Bronze Medal: 6 Students
- *2020 - Hooghly District Kick Boxing Championship:*
 - Gold Medal: 1 Student
 - Silver Medal: 1 Student

2022-2023 –

- Students were awarded certificates after the completion of the course,
- Best performance award was distributed.

Outcome of the Course

The students achieved training in Flying Kicks, Multiple Attack Defense, Exhibiting joint locks, throws. Performing kata demonstrates a martial artist's mastery of technique, fluidity, and understanding of martial principles. Break through cement blocks, showcasing exceptional power and technique. Blindfolded Techniques: Performing techniques or self-defense maneuvers while blindfolded demonstrates a high level of body awareness, sensitivity, and reliance on muscle memory.

Problems encountered and Resources required**Problems:**

1. Some students are hesitant due to confidence issues and unfamiliarity with self-defense.
2. Conservative family mentalities hinder female participation.
3. Limited awareness about self-defence benefits contributes to low enrolment.

4.Lack of proper diet affects their physical capabilities.

Resources required:

- 1.Need more financial resources for rewarding the students with good performance, purchase of dress and food.
- 2.Recrut more trainers to enhance program effectiveness.
- 3.Explore diverse funding avenues for program expansion and improvement
- 4.Establish a reward system to recognize and incentivize active involvement.

In summary, addressing student hesitations requires counseling, motivation, and awards, while securing additional resources and diverse funding is vital for program success and accessibility.

Best Practice 2:

Automotive Vehicle Free Campus

Objective: Serampore Girls College aims to become an Automotive Vehicle Free Campus to foster a pollution-free environment, reduce the carbon footprint, and promote sustainability. The initiative encourages bicycle usage, emphasizing environmental responsibility and the fitness benefits of cycling.

- The Art and Craft exhibition cum sale program organized by the institution acted as a platform for the students to display their artistic skills with the objective of earning while learning.
